**Summary of Nomination:** The nominator is interested in primary research in order to update healthcare information software and make system-to-system information sharing more efficient.

#### Background and Clinical Context

According to the Department of Health and Human Services, the health information exchange (HIE), "...allows doctors, nurses, pharmacists, other health care providers and patients to appropriately access and securely share a patient's vital medical information electronically—improving the speed, quality, safety and cost of patient care."<sup>1</sup> There are different types of HIE, including a directed exchange, where information can be securely exchanged between providers; query-based exchange, where emergency healthcare providers can quickly find or request information on a patient; and consumer mediated exchange, which allows the patient to control their health information and its distribution among medical professionals.<sup>1</sup>
